- Reducing social inequalities in health and wellbeing
 - ➤ Public Health Care System (1988); Social Pensions (1991)
 - ➤ National Policy for Older Persons (1994/96)
 - ➤ Statute for Older Persons (2003)
- Health Promotion, Disease Prevention/Control
 - ➤ National Health Policy for Older Persons (2006)
- Community care (emerging)

Comparative Lessons for other Emerging Countries

- Importance of a rights-based rather than a needs-based approach
- Legislated framework for citizen participation in decision-making and monitoring (Councils for Older Persons)
- Ensuring the presence of key pillars (health care and income security)
- Multisectoral policy framework



Continuing Challenges

- Life-course and inter-generational solidarity perspectives are lacking
- Accountability
 - More laws passed than are implemented
 - ➤ Mechanisms to ensure citizen participation in decisionmaking and monitoring are flawed
 - > Budgeted resources are not channeled to programs
- Lack of coordination/collaboration across policy sectors
- Significant policy gaps: environments for aging; care
