CHALLENGES OF AGEING

- Sustainability of the Welfare State
- New health problems such as diabetes, hypertension, Alzheimer and Dementia
- Health Care services particularly expenditure in gerontology and geriatric
- Need for residential care homes and specialized ones to take care of the elderly persons with severe disabilities
- Reduction in workforce
- Ensuring the security, protection and rights of the elderly.
- Widening of the intergenerational gap
- Increased need for formal and informal carers
- Feminisation of Ageing
- Appropriate infrastructures for the Elderly such as housing units, user-friendly public transport as well as easy and safe access to infrastructures including public & private building



- Carer's Allowance
- Grant for the purchase of medicine
- Free issue of assistive devices such as Wheelchairs, Hearing Aids and Spectacles

- 80 000 Members

- Setting up of a network of the Elderly Watch by volunteers, Elderly Unit, Monitoring Committee and hot lines.
- New budgetary measure- provision of personal Alarm Bracelets/ pendants
