
NSA Issues Survey 2010

- What issues are of prime importance to Australians 50 and over?
- How these issues might influence their voting intentions?
- Are older voters likely to change their voting preference?

Importance of issues


- 1. Health (84%)
- 2. Education (81%)
- 3. Aged Care (73%)
- 4. Superannuation (56%)
- 5. National Security (56%)
- 6. Affordable Housing (55%)
- 7. Climate Change (40%)
- 8. Industrial Relations (32%)
- 9. Immigration (29%)

Traditional Party Preferences



- •Labor preference was higher amongst men than women
- •Individuals aged 65+ preferred the Coalition more than individuals 50-64

Voting Intentions for the Next Federal Election



- •Men 50-64 had a higher preference for Labor
- •Men 65+ had a higher preference for the Coalition.
- •No significant age differences amongst women

Key findings

- 62% of respondents are prepared to <u>change</u> their vote if another political party offered better policies on one of the 9 issues
- The policies most likely to <u>influence their</u> <u>votes</u> were: health (19%), aged care (8%) & climate change (8%)

What's the Next Step?

- Australians over the age of 50 represent over 40% of the voting population
- Recent polls (*Newspoll*) show most dramatic declines in PM's approval rating in over 50s (38% approve and 57% disapprove – April 2010)
