The context - NSW




The most populous state - 6.8 million



NSW Councils

- 152 councils
- Ranging in size from
 5 km² to 53,000 km²
- Populations from 1,400 to 284,000
- Staff from 32 to
 15,000 (median 195)





Local Government Charter

NSW Local Government Act, 1993 responsibilities:

•To provide directly or on behalf of other levels of government, after due consultation, adequate, equitable and appropriate services and facilities for the community

 - Falls prevention
 - Community safety policy for older people






Pilot study findings

- Provision of additional Council services to cater for needs of ageing population
- 2. Increased demands on Council resources especially infrastructure
- Increased financial pressure due to concessions

Larger study – 12 rural and remote councils








9 metropolitan councils


